AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE OFFICIAL ZONING MAP TO REZONE PROPERTY ON LITTLE DEBBIE PARKWAY FROM C-2 (SHOPPING CENTER COMMERCIAL) TO R-1-L (LOW DENSITY SINGLE-FAMILY RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT) AND FURTHER DESCRIBED AS THE PORTION OF HAMILTON COUNTY TAX PARCELS 131 096.04 AND 131 096 AS DEPICTED BY THE MOON SUBDIVISION PLAT RECORDED IN PLAT BOOK 120, PAGE 92 OF THE HAMILTON COUNTY REGISTER OF DEEDS, SAID AREA BEING LOCATED WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF COLLEGEDALE, TENNESSEE

- WHEREAS, in accordance with TCA Section 13-7-203, subsection (a) a public hearing was held with at least fifteen (15) days notice being given prior to final reading of this ordinance; and
- **NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED** by the City of Collegedale, Tennessee that the Official Zoning Map referenced in Section 3.02 of the Collegedale Zoning Ordinance be amended as described herein:
- Section 1: The following described property shall be zoned R-1-L (Low Density Single Family Detached Residential) on the Official Collegedale Zoning Map and shown on the attached illustration titled "Exhibit A":

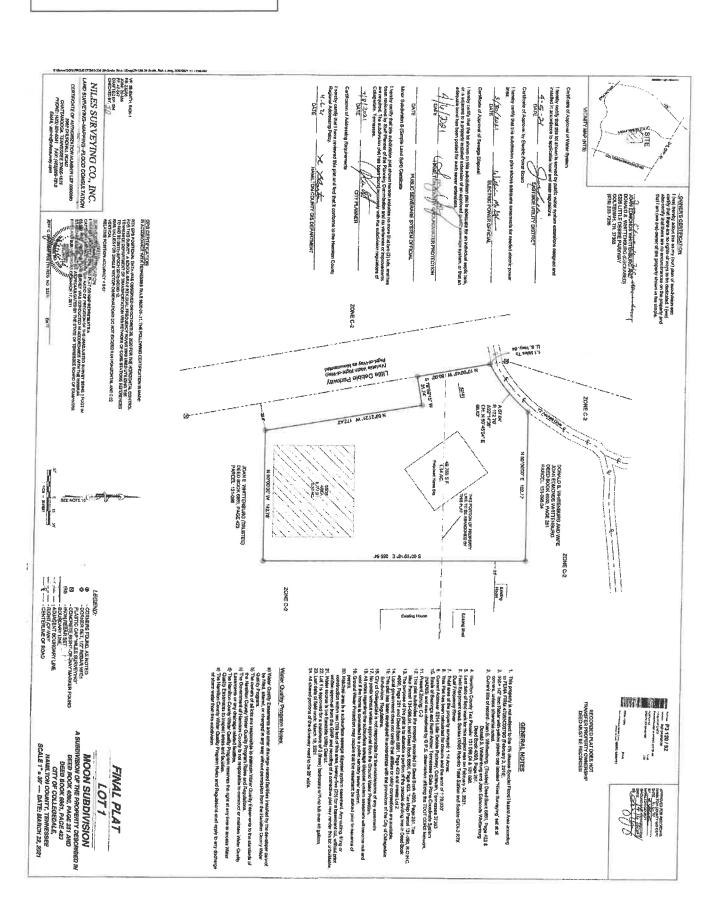

- WHEREAS, Tennessee Code Annotated § 9-1-116 requires that all funds of the State of Tennessee and all its political subdivisions shall first be appropriated before being expended and that only funds that are available shall be appropriated; and
- WHEREAS, the Municipal Budget Law of 1982 requires that the governing body of each municipality adopt and operate under an annual budget ordinance presenting a financial plan with at least the information required by that state statute, that no municipality may expend any moneys regardless of the source except in accordance with a budget ordinance and that the governing body shall not make any appropriation in excess of estimated available funds; and
- WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners has published the annual operating budget and budgetary comparisons of the proposed budget with the prior year (actual) and the current year (estimated) in a newspaper of general circulation not less than ten (10) days prior to the meeting where the Board will consider final passage of the budget.

- SECTION 5: No appropriation listed above may be exceeded without an amendment of the budget ordinance as required by the Municipal Budget Law of 1982 (TCA § 6-56-208). In addition, no appropriation may be made in excess of available funds except to provide for an actual emergency threatening the health, property or lives of the inhabitants of the municipality and declared by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of at least a quorum of the governing body in accord with Tennessee Code Annotated § 6-56-205.
- **SECTION 6**: A detailed financial plan will be attached to this budget and become part of this budget ordinance. In addition, the published operating budget and budgetary comparisons shown by fund with beginning and ending fund balances and the number of full time equivalent employees required by Tennessee Code Annotated § 6-56-206 will be attached.
- SECTION 7: This annual operating and capital budget ordinance and supporting documents shall be submitted to the Comptroller of the Treasury or Comptroller's Designee for approval if the City has debt issued pursuant to Title 9, Chapter 21 of the Tennessee Code Annotated within fifteen (15) days of its adoption. This budget shall not become the official budget for the fiscal year until such budget is approved by the Comptroller of the Treasury or Comptroller's Designee in accordance with Title 9, Chapter 21 of the Tennessee Code Annotated (the "Statutes".) If the Comptroller of the Treasury or Comptroller's Designee determines that the budget does not comply with the Statutes, the Governing Body shall adjust its estimates or make additional tax levies sufficient to comply with the Statutes or as directed by the Comptroller of the Treasury or Comptroller's Designee. If the City does not have such debt outstanding, it will file this annual operating and capital budget ordinance and supporting documents with the Comptroller of the Treasury or Comptroller's Designee.
- **SECTION 8**: All unencumbered balances of appropriations remaining at the end of the fiscal year shall lapse and revert to the respective fund balances.
- **SECTION 9**: All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with any provision of this ordinance are hereby repealed.
- SECTION 10: This ordinance shall take effect July 1, 2021, the public welfare requiring it.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF COLLEGEDALE, TENNESSEE,
TO PROVIDE FOR THE GENERAL REVENUE THEREOF FOR THE FISCAL YEAR
2021-2022 ON AN INTERIM BASIS PENDING RECEIPT OF THE "CERTIFIED
RATE" FROM THE ASSESSOR OF PROPERTY OF HAMILTON COUNTY,
TENNESSEE, PURSUANT TO T.C.A. SECTION 67-5-1701, TO BE KNOWN AS THE
GENERAL REVENUE ORDINANCE FOR SAID YEAR.

WHEREAS, pursuant to the provisions of T.C.A. §67-5-1601 et seq., the Hamilton County Assessor of Property has recently completed or is in the process of completing the reappraisal process therein required; and

WHEREAS, as of the adoption of this Ordinance, the Assessor of Property has not as yet provided to the City of Collegedale the "certified tax rate" mandated by T.C.A. §67-5-1701, which rate is calculated so as to provide the same ad valorem revenue for the City of Collegedale as was levied during the fiscal year 2021-2022; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary, and required by other provisions of law, that the city set its tax rate for the ensuing fiscal year on or before June 30 of each year; and

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF COLLEGEDALE, TENNESSEE, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. Pending receipt of the "certified tax rate" pursuant to T.C.A. §67-5-1701 from the Hamilton County Tax Assessor, that there be and there is hereby levied a tax on each \$100 of taxable property in the City of Collegedale, Tennessee, as of January 1, 2021 for the fiscal year July 1, 2021 through June 30, 2022, as follows:

"General Fund Tax" \$1.65

Total Tax \$1.65

SECTION 2. Provided further that conditioned upon compliance with the provisions of T.C.A. §67-5-1702, that the City may subsequently set a tax rate in excess of or less than the certified rate by resolution and/or by subsequently enacted ordinance.

SECTION 3. The engaging in any vocation, occupation, business or business activity, enumerated, described or hereby declared to be a privilege, and each person defined in said Act, shall pay for exercising said privilege to this City the sums authorized and permitted to be charged by municipalities under the provisions of said Act. All of the provisions of said Chapter 387, Public Acts of Tennessee for the year 1971, insofar as they are applicable to, or pertaining to, the levying of taxes, by a municipality, are hereby adopted as fully and completely as though specifically set forth therein.

SECTION 4. This ordinance shall be known as the General Revenue Ordinance for the fiscal year 2021-2022, and until such time as an ordinance or, as provided above, a resolution, amending this Ordinance can be enacted, shall hereafter be automatically amended and adjusted, based on the assessment to be certified by the Hamilton County Assessor of Property so as to produce the revenues necessary to meet the budget requirements of 2021-2022 Ordinance No., for the "General Fund Tax" and the Total Tax, as set forth in Section 1 hereof, supra, and this Ordinance shall take effect from and after the date of its final passage, the public welfare of the City of Collegedale, Tennessee, requiring it.

SECTION 5. All Ordinances or part of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 6. Every section, sentence, clause, and phrase of this Ordinance is separable and severable. Should any section, sentence, clause or phrase be declared unconstitutional or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, said unconstitutionality or invalidity shall not effect or impair any other section, sentence, clause or phrase.
